Season's greetings cards share kindness and good will

"Both organizations are natural partners as our missions are to engage and serve the wider community at large," said Ginger Williams, executive director of Edgewater Village.

In 2020, the Village launched the project with 29 dedicated participants who wrote 541 cards that were delivered to senior residences in Edgewater, Uptown, Andersonville, and Rogers Park. "It only takes a small effort, but may have a big impact," Ginger added. "Please join us to make this year's efforts even bigger as we reach out to share season's greetings to more people."

Katy Linehan, co-chair of Edgewater Village's Program Committee and adult services librarian at the Edgewater Branch Library, explained how the project began. "Especially during the pandemic when older adults were isolated in their residences and not allowed to have in-person visitors, we wanted to let them know they were not forgotten," Katy said. "Just because we couldn't be together doesn't mean they had to be completely alone. We hope the cards would put smiles on their faces and let them know we're thinking about them."
